Welcome to our annual report on the major activities we have undertaken in the past year. I say "major" as it would be extremely difficult to list everything we do on behalf of our citizens. If you consider the motto of law enforcement, "To protect and to serve," it's easy to see that fighting crime is half of our job. Serving you is the other.

We've been busy. Since 2003, arrests are up 22 percent. Last year we responded to 3,734 more calls for assistance than we did four years ago. The fight against illegal drugs continues with large methamphetamine busts and arrests of high-profile drug pushers. We recently rounded up numerous deadbeat parents.

Our personnel continue to be some of the best-trained in the state. We take very seriously the awesome responsibility of responding as quickly as possible to a call for help. We strive to keep up with the latest technology and constantly upgrade equipment to provide our staff with the tools needed to keep our streets safe.

As our parish grows, maintaining good communication between the public and this office becomes a larger challenge. If we all make an effort to get to know new residents and businesses and look out for one another, we can promote a sense of community to make St. John even safer. We would be happy to attend your next neighborhood gathering and update you on SJBPSO happenings.

A new, free program on Internet child safety, hosted by our department, is available to your school or civic group. We keep enhancing our cyber crimes unit. Safety checks for motorists are being conducted, new equipment is ready to serve you and we maintain a highly visible presence in neighborhoods and commercial areas.

Eye In The Sky

Taking our efforts to protect citizens to "new heights," the SJBPSO has acquired a unique tool to provide an added police presence. An aerial observation unit, named "The Eye in the Sky" or "Big Brother" can be elevated nearly 30 feet, giving officers a "bird's eye" view of crowds at festivals, parades, athletic events or a parking lot.

The \$75,000 air-conditioned unit, with a 360 degree view is equipped with radios, spotlights and public address system. Cameras can transmit live video and photographs while digitally recording images for evidence. The unit is powered by a generator or batteries with solar panels.

"We will also use this unit during the Christmas shopping season to oversee crowded parking lots" Sheriff Jones said. "If a deputy spots something unusual, he can instantly notify a deputy on the ground to take action."



Cyber Crime Unit

Every day, children are solicited on-line and the SJBPSO is taking steps to stop it.



"When suspected pedophiles make contact with what they think are children in our parish, they may be chatting with a specially-trained, undercover detective," Sheriff Jones said. "We have more than \$50,000 worth of new forensic computer equipment that re-creates evidence on a hard drive, cell phone or PDA even if erased by the user."

The cyber crimes unit works with local law enforcement agencies, Louisiana State Police, the Louisiana Attorney General's Office and the FBI Child Exploitation Unit to fight child predators and other on-line illegal activity.

"We are making solid cases against these criminals who will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law" Sheriff Jones said. "Nothing is more important than protecting our children."

The FBI has put together this list of signs that a child may be at risk on-line

- Your child spends large amounts of time on-line, especially at night.
- You find pornography on your child's computer.
- Vour child receives phone calls from people you don't know or is making calls, sometimes long distance, to numbers you don't recognize.
- Your child receives mail, gifts, or packages from someone you don't know.
- Your child turns the computer monitor off or quickly changes the screen on the monitor when you come into the room.
- Your child becomes withdrawn from the family.
- Your child is using an on-line account belonging to someone else.

Instruct children:

- To never arrange a face-to-face meeting with someone they met on-line.
- To never upload (post) pictures of themselves onto the Internet or on-line service to people they do not personally know.
- Never give out identifying information such as their name, home address, school name, or telephone number.
- Never download pictures from an unknown source, as there is a good chance they could be sexually explicit images.
- To never respond to messages or bulletin board postings that are suggestive, obscene, or harassing.
- That whatever they are told on-line may or may not be true.

Big Blue

The SJBPSO has acquired at no charge, a 12 ton armored personnel carrier (APC). The 16 foot long and 9 foot wide vehicle can be used in an emergency or in the event of a disturbance where law enforcement must take extreme measures.

"This vehicle can go through four-footdeep water, climb a two foot wall and cross a six foot span or ditch, allowing us to evacuate people if necessary," Sheriff Jones said. "It can carry 13 people to safety or transport personnel through a hazardous situation."

The APC, nicknamed "Big Blue" was donated by another sheriff's office. Refurbished with inmate labor, it sports a 275 horsepower engine and can travel at up to 40 miles per hour.

Safety Checks

In order to keep motorists safe and traffic moving, SJBPSO personnel conduct safety checkpoints across the parish. In 2006, 1,153 motor vehicle accidents were reported in St. John including 571 with injuries and 15 fatalities.

Deputies are looking for seat belt usage, valid driver's licenses, current inspection stickers and license plates, vehicle registration, proof of insurance and child seat usage if applicable.

Using a seatbelt is the easiest way to prevent injuries and deaths in the event of an accident. Motorists caught not buckled up are subject to a \$25 fine.

The Louisiana Highway Safety Commission estimates that three quarters of the state's motorists routinely buckle up. The national average is 81 percent.




